The Churches enjoyed an amazing Palm Sunday weekend last month. On the Saturday night over 40 people attended 'Laughter in Lent' with bestselling author and regular radio contributor, Matt Woodcock. Matt gave a professional, entertaining and spiritual presentation that addressed relevant issues for our faith today.

There was a strong sense of this being an inclusive Saturday night community event as we enjoyed a



drink or two from the bar. Afterwards I received feedback that it was moving to hear Matt speak about people's response to a warm welcome when they engaged with church for the first time. We heard stories of new disciples gaining confidence in life and faith. There was a great story to finish of a young man who thought he wouldn't be allowed through the doors of his local Church who a month later found himself joining the church choir.

On Palm Sunday a similar number of people gathered on Buckden Green for the procession, and more folk joined us for the service at Hubberholme. Matt co-led the service with me and preached a wonderful sermon. He asked people to imagine themselves in the crowd when Jesus entered Jerusalem, and think where they would be - hanging back a bit ... aloof ... up the front cheering ... in the middle blending in.

Matt encouraged us all to take the opportunity to ask more questions of our faith and be more open to God's call. It was fantastic to have our visiting speaker preach with such joy and sensitivity. What better way for us to get in the right frame of mind for Easter.



Tapestry Weaving with Anna Wetherall

Wednesday 10 July 10 am to 4pm Conistone with Kilnsey Hall

Anna has been weaving tapestry since 2013 exhibiting her work as part of several group exhibitions. She studied with a number of leading UK tapestry weavers, is an active member of the British Tapestry Group and runs Nearly Wild Weaving with colleague, Irene. Her inspiration for weaving comes from the natural world, the landscape and its history. She aims to convey a sense of place, the touchstone of a point in time. As a geologist and ecologist, she sees the processes and patterns that have shaped what is around us, this is reflected in the tapestries she weaves. She is passionate about connecting people and nature and has found that tapestry weaving and other approaches to artistic creativity can make a massive difference to people's health and wellbeing. Come and explore the patterns, textures, colours and shapes in the landscape, translating them into simple woven tapestry. We will take a short stroll outside to look at the views and local features (weather permitting), taking our inspiration from what we see and perhaps hear. We will then return indoors and explore how we can translate our ideas into

tapestry in simple ways, or, if you have woven before, perhaps stretching your skills in new ways. Suitable for beginners and improvers. Bring your own equipment if you have it, but there will also be looms warped up ready to go and a range of weft yarn for you to use. Additional equipment will be available for sale, should you wish to continue weaving after the workshop day. Cost: £20 (UWALS subsidy), tea, coffee etc included. Please provide your own lunch.

🛇 Brushing up your Shakespeare......

t's 5 o'clock, one raw March Saturday afternoon in Kettlewell. Late walkers Lare trailing back to their cars and B&B's, and TV's flicker with Saturday teatime news and Six Nations highlights. Shop and cafes are closing their doors, whilst in the pubs there is the hum of early evening trade as folk start to settle down for the evening. But from the Village Hall there emerges an entirely different sound. On the stroke of 5, some twenty voices speak, quietly at first, but with growing confidence and conviction, until the babble reaches a crescendo before passionate slowly subsiding. An intrigued audience of 50 or so watch and listen, with intense curiosity.

What is this all about? It's the sound Shakespeare's sonnets - or at least, 20 of them (he wrote a mere 154.) And this is *Fourteen Lines*, a year in the development and planning, but only a day in rehearsal.

The presenters/performers include locals and some from further afield, relative voungsters in their 30's through to seniors of 90+, and a few seasoned thespian types alongside those entirely new to 'this kind of Thev work thing'. as а carefully choreographed ensemble. reading. narrating, explaining and performing as they lead their audience on an illustrated tour of this often-overlooked byway of Shakespeare's work. There are even jokes! One visiting reviewer later describes the event as 'a real treat indeed...a superbly crafted a blend of research and scholarship, extracts from Shakespeare's plays, and above all, the sonnets themselves into a most enjoyable programme of readings.'

Supported by a modest grant from Yorkshire Dales Millenium Trust, *Fourteen Lines* was just the latest stage in UWALS' ongoing *Discover Shakespeare* strand. Next up is *Country Matters*, which will enable participants to explore the representation of

city, court and country in Shakespeare, before working towards an original presentation/performance.

Perhaps unsurprisingly for someone who moved between rural Warwickshire and Elizabethan London, in plays such as *As You Like It, The Winter's Tale* and *A Midsummer Night's Dream* Shakespeare explores contrasts and tensions between the rural world and the culture of the city. The issues that emerge often have startling contemporary and local resonance – questions of land ownership and the environment, locals and 'offcomed uns', rural poverty and privilege, culture wars, even climate change. Sounds familiar?

Our explorations begin with a full day's enjoyably practical voice, text and language workshop, developing a range of engaging approaches to Shakespeare's language and moving his scripts 'from page to stage' with a focus on some short scenes from these plays. It's on **Saturday 29 June at Kettlewell Village Hall, 10am-4pm (£5).**

s I'm writing this, the first few weeks of April have come and gone with only the most fleeting of moments where spring and all its usual bounty have felt present and available to enjoy. The month carried on following the same dismal trend of the previous six; abundant rainfall and scowling grey skies, and almost an entire absence of sunshine. Daffodil blooms have hung heavy, laden with raindrops.

The occasional day or even hour of sunshine has induced an almost giddy delight, such has been the level of depravation. Exposure to sunlight releases that magic neurotransmitter in the brain, serotonin. This in turns

boost mood, focus and cognitive function. It's no surprise that what has felt like an eternal winter has left us feeling sluggish, down and frustrated. I have spent an inordinate amount of time looking at long range weather forecasts to ascertain when there might be a lifting of the gloom, and a prolonged dry spell.

In Japanese life, Sakura offer a beautiful symbol of the impermanence of all things. There is



something deeply profound that at the very peak of their beauty, the blooms flutter to the ground, to be carried off by the breeze.

For me, there is never enough time to feast my eyes on the cherry blossom, and I always have in my mind the wonderful AE Housman poem that rings so true:

Loveliest of trees

Loveliest of trees, the cherry now Is hung with bloom along the bough, And stands about the woodland ride Wearing white for Eastertide.

Now, of my threescore years and ten, Twenty will not come again, And take from seventy springs a score, It only leaves me fifty more.

And since to look at things in bloom Fifty springs are little room, About the woodlands I will go To see the cherry hung with snow. *Rebecca Ward-Dooley*
